

# *PS. CEBES. ADDENDA ET CORRIGENDA*

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The *Addenda et Corrigenda* are arranged in the order of the original article (CTC 6.1–14). As a result of research conducted for the article on “Epictetus” (pp. 2–54 above), further bibliographical and manuscript information is available and the doubtful commentary by Bernhardus Copius has been located. The 1640 Leiden edition does not contain the translation of Hieronymus Wolfius but, as noted on p. 4a26, Johannes Elichmannus' trilingual text (Greek, Latin, Arabic) of the *Tabula* followed by Ludovicus Odaxius' translation.

#### COMMENTARIES

##### d. Hieronymus Wolfius

p. 13b45–48. Correct to:

Hieronymus Wolfius' brief *Annotationes* to the *Tabula* are found in the first editions of his translation, published at Basel in 1561 and 1563 (listed on p. 9a41–46). The *Annotationes* are printed immediately after the text and translation of the *Tabula*.

#### F. DOUBTFUL COMMENTARIES

##### 1. Bernhardus Copius

p. 14b20–27: Replace with:

Copius' commentary in the 1590 Frankfurt edition, which also contains a translation by his son-in-law Reinerus Langius, consists of two parts: prolegomena (pp. 64 [46 ed.]–81) and notes (pp. 83–109). The prolegomena contain the following chapters: "Partitio artium et literarum omnium" (pp. 64–69); "Partitio ethicae secundum Academicos et Peripateticos" (pp. 69–73); "Partitio ethicae secundum Stoicos, breviter collata" (pp. 73–74); and "Partitio et interpretatio in Cebetis Tabulam" (pp. 74–81). There follows a brief note on the author Cebes (pp. 81–82). The notes on the Greek text start with a series of notes on Hesiod's poem on the two roads (pp. 82–83). The notes "ad ipsam Tabulam Cebetis Thebani" start on p. 83. Many notes serve to explain particular words and phrases; in some cases Copius makes remarks on the composition of the text, or adduces philosophical and historical parallels.

#### *Biography:*

Bernhardus Copius (Bernhard Cop) was born at Stromberg in 1525. He studied law in Loewen and Cologne as well as Latin, Greek, and Hebrew. After completing his studies he became conrector of the school in Dortmund; subsequently he was rector of schools in Münster, Paderborn, Lippstedt, and Lemgo. In 1567 he became doctor of law in Marburg, where he took up the post of professor of Greek in 1569, and of law in 1580. On 12 December 1581 he succumbed to the plague.

#### *Works:*

Besides the ps. Cebes commentary, Copius wrote *Idea sive partitio totius philosophiae, ex Platone potissimum et Aristotele collecta. Accessit praeterea dialogus Platonis de philosophia graecus, cum versione Reineri Langii Bremani, et notis D. Copii, itemque de controversiis logicarum artium tollendis iudicium* (Marburg, 1588); *Methodica analysis institutionum iuris civilis cum oratione de studio juris recte instituendo* (Marburg, 1588). Like the ps. Cebes commentary, these works were published posthumously.
